A summary of the findings show 100% of the people who completed an evaluation formed agreed:

- The event is best held in the evening
- The venue and facilities were appropriate
- 89% agreed the event was a good opportunity for parents to meet and have their say
- 23% thought that the timings and pace could be better
- 100% enjoyed the presentation from the Executive Director on the important role parents have in supporting children's learning
- 94% found the wee blether helpful but requested more time
- 97% felt confident on sharing what they had learned with other parents / their school / family
